

We used this book almost exclusively in my strings methods class and I can't tell you how much information this book has. It is literally GOLD. I was hesitant about buying it at first because sometimes you don't use the books the professors assign, but man did we use this one! The first couple of chapters are about the history of the instruments, but then it includes all sorts of good information about how to size instruments, set a beginning student up, and then how to teach many different kinds of technical skills, like vibrato, at varying skill levels. It also includes games to play with your student to warm up/practice motions in new and creative ways. I used this book when I first started teaching private violin lessons and the tools in this book were incredibly helpful and boosted my confidence as a non-violinist teaching a violin lesson!

I bought this book for a Strings Techniques class for my undergraduate degree in Music Education and I found it very helpful for the course as well as my personal studies with my own class.

I really appreciate how this book is organized. Hamann and Gillespie have truly mastered the art of sequencing. If you haven't already read the book, it is really worth a review, especially if you are looking for a good string pedagogy textbook. I would caution the reviewer regarding the bass pedagogy. It is a bit imprecise and needs further updating. There are also several instances of

imprecise citations, which have caused me several headaches. Overall, a must have.

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
