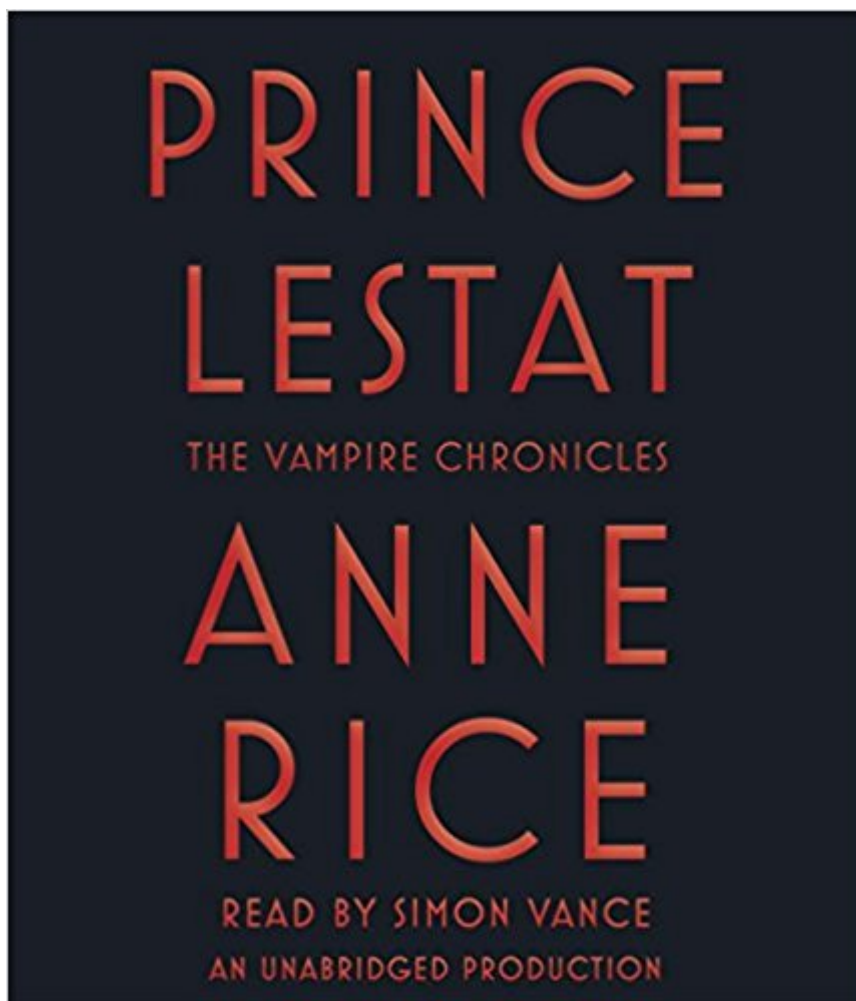

Prince Lestat: The Vampire Chronicles



Synopsis

As the novel moves from present-day New York and the West Coast to ancient Egypt, fourth century Carthage, 14th-century Rome, the Venice of the Renaissance, the worlds and beings of all the Vampire Chronicles—Louis de Pointe du Lac; the eternally young Armand, whose face is that of a Boticelli angel; Mekare and Maharet, Pandora and Flavius; David Talbot, vampire and ultimate fixer from the secret Talamasca; and Marius, the true Child of the Millennia; along with all the other new seductive, supernatural creatures—come together in this large, luxuriant, fiercely ambitious novel to ultimately rise up and seek out who-or what-the Voice is, and to discover the secret of what it desires and why. And, at the book's center, the seemingly absent, curiously missing hero-wanderer, the dazzling, dangerous rebel-outlaw—the great hope of the Undead, the dazzling Prince Lestat.

Many new/old characters briefly heard from and everything simply works out beautifully in the end. I do insist on a happy ending- something to do with my life and horrific surprises- so it is appreciated but the story did not shake my world. Love Mrs Rice's style and will continue to read whatever comes next. Hope springs eternally, like vampires. One caveat....where is her sequel to Rameses the Damned!?! It was promised at the end of the first publishing of that wonderful story and we've been waiting an awful long time.

I LOVED all of Rice's other Vampire books & was disappointed when she decided to stop writing them. When a friend told me she had written a new Lestat novel I was excited but worried at the same time. I was worried that since it had been so long since the last book that it might feel and sound different than the others. But Rice delivered maybe my second fav book in the series! it sounds and feels like she wrote the book a week after she had the last and i was very happy. A definite must read for any Anne Rice fan!!!

Anne's love for her vampire family shines in this book; while I found the ending telegraphed throughout (in other words, it was easy to predict this book's outcome) she threw in a number of entertaining twists that were quite engaging to read. Her writing is at its best in this series; she has

other book series (including the current Wolf Gift books) but they don't seem to have quite the amount of love and thought put into them as her Vampire Chronicles. I'm happy to see her voicing her Brat Prince again - Lestat is her finest character and she's never better than when describing the world through his mind. While this isn't as great of a work as some of her earlier entries in the Chronicles (her earliest books in the series were by far her best), this does continue the tale wonderfully, introducing a number of new characters (and sadly, wrapping up the storyline for some others). There is a sense of finality, though - it feels like Anne wants to put this series to bed with this book. I hope not - Lestat is delicious - but it does feel like this was intended to be the denouement of the Chronicles.

This is the book I have been waiting for. Before taking a break with the vampires, the books seemed to always be missing something that made them exceptional. Nothing could match the awesomeness of the first three books. I have to say that Prince Lestat finds that missing piece. It felt like the proper follow-up to Queen Of The Damned. While the plot is somewhat predictable, that doesn't make it any less fun to read. It is a great return for Anne and I hope she can keep up the new found momentum.

Wow; just wow. I'm so glad that Anne Rice has returned to what she does best: The Vampire Chronicles. This eleventh entry easily became my favorite of the bunch, dethroning "Memnoch The Devil" in the process. It was such an enjoyable and nostalgic read for me; revisiting old characters I'd grown to love over the course of two plus decades reading the series, and being introduced to new ones. It can get a bit long-winded at times, but fans of Rice know that she leaves no detail unexplored. Highly recommended.
