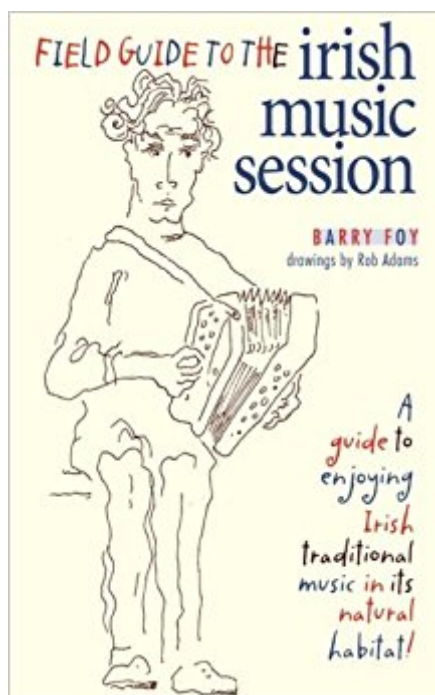

"Traditional Irish Music", and tells it like it is. This should be essential reading for those who are new to the music, or for those who are actually serious about it, and willing to learn. It is not an end all, or be all guide to the music by any means, but it will give you some of the much needed knowledge that will help put you in good stead with "Traditional", musicians. All, are more than welcome to join in a session, who understand the value of what the Author, has written about, no matter their ability. Everyone in a session, was a beginner at one point in time. Judging by many of the negative comments, many people apparently do not "Get It", and probably never will. And for those people, lighten up. The book was obviously not written to massage your ignorant fragile egos, or to validate your strange narcissistic fantasies of what the music is all about. The book was written about the "Sessions", where the true heart, and soul of the music all comes together. If you are not willing to understand, or respect "Traditional Irish Music", "Please", do everyone a favor. Stay far, far away. You will never have a true place in it, except possibly in your own minds.

Might be useful in certain situation. Certainly worth reading by all folks who play in sessions. If you take the book as a light-hearted, maybe sarcastic read, then it's a lot of fun. (I passed it around our core session group and they found it amusing, not authoritative.) I do consider the book to be on the "elitist" side. I play in an Irish session on group at a pub. I'm not playing in the New York Philharmonic or at Juilliard. In my humble opinion, Irish session music is based on a FOLK art -- a musical idiom that emerged from the common people. It's not a "classical" musical art with strict rules based on a structured theoretical foundation or a rich academic tradition. And it's certainly not overseen by well-off "salon patrons." Being a critical thinker, I like to say "Who says?" Well ... Who says? This is the opinion of the author, and I respect it. He has some good insights, but I don't consider the book to be an authoritative "last word" on Irish sessions. Don't take it seriously, but do enjoy it! I did.

A quick, semi-humorous, somewhat profane take on the "rules" of the Irish session. Might be a bit confusing for the true novice, ironically, but is hilarious for those with some experience with the culture and expectations of a "true" session. I laughed often, and have leant it out subsequently, but the information should be taken at least partially tongue and cheek.

As a new whistler who'd love to play *tunes* in a session sometime, I found the advice here to be invaluable, written with that quick Irish wit that I love so much. Glad to find out about session etiquette ahead of time so I know what to expect, and what's expected of me when I'm ready to

jump in.

This humorous and insightful guide is helpful for the musician who has learned a few Irish tunes (or aspires to learning them) and is ready to tackle a session, as well as the Irish pub-goer who regularly notices the musicians jamming over in the corner and wonders what it's all about.

Appropriate and inappropriate instruments for a session, expected participant behavior, the different types of tunes and their playing styles and speeds, and why sessions are important to the vitality of Irish traditional music are all covered. The book is short, sweet, and to the point, just like an Irish dance tune.

After spending a few years hanging around the local sessions, everything in here makes sense (and it's pretty darn funny, too -- if you enjoy a little biting humor).
