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Q: When you were in school, were you a Goody Two-shoes, a bit of rebel or did you fall somewhere in between? Becky Cloonan: I fell squarely in between the two. I still do! It's a good place to be. You don't want to be too good! Be just bad enough to keep people on their toes, but you

don't want to burn bridges either. It's a tricky balancing act! Brenden Fletcher: I thought I was a Goody Two-shoes, but always managed to raise the ire of those in charge. Seems I didn't really take well to figures of authority. Go figure. Karl Kersch: Super Goody Two-shoes until grade eleven, and then I got seriously into comics and developed a problem with authority. Q: What's it like writing such young characters? Did you have to do any all-ages research to get in the mindsets of the students at Gotham Academy? Becky: A lot of Maps and Olive's relationship is based on me and my best friend growing up! Memories and friendships and people I knew, all this informs Gotham Academy. A lot of the characters and relationships come from real places, even if in the end they don't resemble any one particular person. I try not to make the book too topical either, so that in ten years it still reads like it was written yesterday. Brenden: My niece was seven when Becky, Karl and I began imagining the world and characters of GOTHAM ACADEMY. Between spending time with my niece and investigating my own interests (aka "regressing back to my childhood") the characters emerged naturally. Writing Maps is positively the most fun one can possibly have working in comics. I highly recommend it to any writer who can pry the character from my hands! Q: Will we be getting any looks into the backgrounds of fan-favorite characters like Pomeline Fritch, Colton Rivera and the Mizoguchi siblings in the future? Becky: Yes! Fans of Maps will be happy to know she is teaming up with the one and only Damian Wayne for Gotham Academy issue 7! And fans of Kyle will really enjoy issue 8 as we get to know these characters a lot more in this next series. I can't wait for people to read these issues! Brenden: We're so excited to dig into the backgrounds of all the characters of GOTHAM ACADEMY but at only 20 pages a month in which to tell our story we're barely able to cram in all the mystery and action the book requires! Maybe if we're lucky Maps will get her own miniseries one day! Karl: We have backstories for all of the characters, and issue 8 is pretty much ALL Mizoguchi. I would draw a whole series about the Mizoguchi family! They're the best. Q: Karl, You have such a beautiful and unique art style what's inspired and informed it? Karl: Thank you! I try to draw differently depending on the story I'm drawing. Gotham Academy is inspired by a lifelong interest in animation as I'm trying to approximate the feeling of traditional cel animation over painted backgrounds, which would be impossible without the fantastic team of colorists on our book. Stylistically, my sense of design owes a lot to Studio Ghibli, Macross and Street Fighter.

Gr 7 Up This slick volume collects the first six issues of the DC comics set in a prestigious

school in Gotham City. After a traumatic summer, Olive Silverlock struggles to get back into her school routine while showing around new student Maps Mizoguchi and trying to avoid her ex, Kyle, Maps's older brother. But with a possible ghost knocking on the walls and secret societies roaming the halls, Olive isn't coping well with the knowledge of her mother's precarious health condition, her studies, and her classmates' bullying. When the teen begins to recover strange memories about a fire and keeps running into a mysterious stranger with glowing eyes who seems to know her more than she knows him, she bands with other school misfits to uncover some of Gotham Academy's dark secrets. Filled with spunky and quirky characters and unexpected plot turns, this work adds an intriguing and fresh layer to the Batman mythos. In this tale, Bruce Wayne, the school's benefactor, is treated with disdain by Olive and the Batman signal is a daily occurrence. Kersch's campy art is by turns luminous and gloomy, enhancing Cloonan and Fletcher's energetic and sometimes contemplative text. The size and shape of the panels are used to great effect, adeptly building momentum with panache and verve. I began this series after being introduced to Gotham Academy through the Batgirl series. The lead character of Olive Sliverlocke is an intriguing protagonist. While it sometimes leans too heavily towards the soap opera-esque shenanigans of middle and high school, the overall storyline explored in the first volume is developed richly by the end of the text, incorporating at least one other notable DC character into the mix. Fans of Harry Potter or Lumberjanes will certainly see parallels in this series. It's well worth picking up if you looking for a fun and intriguing comic geared towards teens and young adults.

After nearly 4 years of not touching DC comics this brought me back and has me hooked on Gotham again. Examining Gotham's supernatural and historical mysteries through the eyes of a lovable cast of young characters who don't make me enjoy ever interaction has been a treat. Every aspect of this book is amazing; the writing, the art, and my god the colors! Very disappointing the colorist for this title did not win an award for this work, as it's striking and memorable. This book is also a perfect choice for a child. It's spooky while still being all-ages friendly and evokes the same whimsical mystery as the Harry Potter books, with the same hidden depths.

Really great art, the dynamic panel layouts work really well and are clearly done with purpose and not just to be different. The last book I read that was able to use this type of dynamic layout so well was the first 'Danger Girl' series. The story is good as well, the pacing is great. I would say it's a great all-ages book. But I think it's probably more of a 13 and up read unless your child is pretty advanced.

Honestly, this volume was kinda all over the place? It was a bit confusing in places, like it was trying to cram too many leads and details and introductions in too fast, and it kept switching direction every chapter. It might be a good start to a series, but it's hard to tell only reading volume 1 because volume 1 is definitely a START and somewhat of a shaky one.

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
