


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Little Brown Handbook, The, MLA Update Edition (13th Edition)

Of the several editions of the Little, Brown Handbook I've owned (I buy the odd-numbered editions) and read cover-to-cover over the years, this (11th) edition will answer almost any question you have about writing. My last edition was the 9th and this one is significantly better, with better layout and colors to make every element on the page easier to read, even diacritical marks. Unfortunately, with purchase you are not given access to the companion website[...], and the book's own preface does not recommend the site. Pearson has plastered the website ad in every chapter, in a special section of the book, and on the back cover. Completely unnecessary and no class. If you're going to get an English handbook, start with Little, Brown. But also get the definitive source, *The Chicago Manual of Style*, which also includes several chapters on punctuation, grammar, and style. Finally, round out your education with Joseph M. Williams' *Style: The Basics of Clarity and Grace*.

The Little Brown Handbook was a required textbook when I was in college in 1994. It continues to be the best reference book--and everyone who writes and publishes a book should use it. One of my biggest complaints regarding the ease of self-publishing is that the end product is so poorly written/edited that the author should be ashamed of themselves for expecting readers to pay for the shoddy work.

It's really difficult to believe that the authors can crank out this excellent level of content, and put in real new stuff, as opposed to just putting in cosmetic changes and to kill the second-hand book market, but they do. A beautifully designed book, with new material that is stimulating, as well as the content you just don't get in a very crowded field. Pedagogically, it is a case study in how layout, boxes, arrows and colour are so important to make a point clear. Even more impressive is that the standard 3-year turnaround for a new edition is now two years (11th ed- 2010; 12th ed:2012). And yet Freshman Composition remains a strange animal: like gridiron, a US creature, but there's nothing here that could not be cognitively grasped by a year 10 secondary student: yet the secondary system keeps failing- not just in the US, but in Australia and the UK and the Anglosphere. marks for bad grammar, spelling and punctuation- starting at five per cent last year, it's now up to 12: [...] .Fowler and Aaron should perhaps consider another text for a younger market, differentiating it so that they don't cannibalize themselves and their market. But I think the FC juggernaut is unstoppable (just like the galley slaves in English departments who teach FC work in conditions and with salary that are unspeakable). A nice complement to LBH would be the hidden treasure of Virginia Tufte's *Artful Sentences: Syntax as Style*-
